With dedicated efforts spanning over almost two decade, college has made excellent progress and has emerged as one of the top ranked colleges in the state of Maharashtra. Our First Year result is consistently higher than University result. Final Year B.E. results more than 95%, where 60% or more students pass with Distinction/First Class. Success rate is more than 85%. Around 35% qualify in competitive examinations viz. GMAT /GRE/TOFEL/GATE/CET/CAT every year.

TCET competes with 64 engineering colleges affiliated with UOM. Of these 64 colleges, two colleges are government aided colleges and 62 un-aided (private) institutions. Besides these local colleges in Mumbai, the Institute also competes at national level with 3000 plus such institutions with respect to attracting JEE/CET rank holders, programs offered, value added courses, services offering, campus placement, institutional brand etc. Institute also compete with respect to program accreditation, rating and ranking, industry tie-ups, regulatory compliance, university results, placement, research based programs, center of excellence and innovation center. Currently institute is among top 10 colleges affiliated to University of Mumbai (UoM), and among top 100 in the national rank my Outlook Survey 2018. TCET is known for infrastructure and the world class educational facilities for engineering education. The College offers outstanding infrastructure which provides conducive environment and the right academic ambience. Key infrastructure includes:

Auditorium

The college has a state-of-the-art, plushy, air-conditioned auditorium like none other in the city of Mumbai. It is equipped with the most modern lighting and sound systems. It plays host to most of the seminars, inaugural and valedictory function that are a part of the many technical festivals / conference / academic programmes. The annual cultural festival and annual day are also held in the auditorium. It is used for presentation for campus recruitment including pool camp by many companies. It has a seating capacity of 585.

Classrooms / Seminar Halls

Air-conditioned classrooms/seminar halls are well designed and well equipped with single seater benches. It ensures learning in peaceful and comfortable environment. Each classroom has the seating capacity upto 80. Institute has four seminar rooms well equipped with audio-visual, smart boards, INTERNET, Wi-fi connections and the seating arrangement viz cluster, class room, theater, conference arrangement etc. Seating arrangement varies from 26 to 180. These seminar rooms can also get digitally connected with the provision of streaming video facility.

College is under expansion for the horizontal and vertical growth and to provide better facilities to the Students. Therefore, two floors with the area of approximately 7500 sq. mtrs. are to be added to the existing building. Work in progress in full swing.

There is also a high-tech Language Laboratory to help students to improve their communication skills. Laboratories are well equipped with branded equipments, kits, computing facilities, computer based laboratories, INTERNET facilities etc.

R&D and Incubation & Entrepreneur Development Cell (IEDC)

Thakur College of Engineering and Technology (TCET) believes in quality, relevance and sustainable education which is possible only with strong R & D activities. Research activities are encouraged at both departmental as well as institute level. Well equipped research laboratories have been established in the institute and additional facilities can be availed as per requirements. Academic research is carried out in the department and Idea to Entrepreneurship projects are Incubated in IEDC.

Cafeteria

The College accommodates a large number of students in cafeteria. At a time more than 200 students can be served. Highly nutritious, quality food with wide varieties are made available for students at affordable prices. Proper hygiene is maintained. Additional space is provided for cafeteria attached with auditorium. Tea and snacks are served wherever there is programme in auditorium.

ICT Infrastructure

Institute has an excellent infrastructure consisting of Local Area Network (LAN) on which 1200 computers are connected to INTERNET with the BW of 157 Mbps. ERP with LMS is also deployed for campus management. Network Infrastructure highlight includes:

- High Speed Servers with 1200 Dell/HP/HCL Desktops, Workstations as Windows/Linus clients. Microsoft Campus Agreement Licences and high end Application / Utility Softwares.
- Robust Campus Network configured with Gigabit CISCO backbone switches and Optical Fibre, installed on Windows / Linux servers with high speed Wifi Connectivity.
- High Speed leased line connectivity having 157 Mbps bandwidth with integrated RP systems. A dedicated 2 Mbps lease line internet connectivity for IIT Bombay Remote Center for faculty and student development and research programmes.
- Highly Secured Network with Fortinet 600D Firewall & Symantec Endpoint Antivirus for security through campus agreement.
- High Speed leased line connectivity in all classrooms & laboratories connected with INTERNET/Projection Facility
- Campus surveillance system with 200 high end CCTV cameras and DVRs with 15 days backup storage having facility to provide the footages to stakeholders on request. It has dedicated control room fitted with four TV displays, for monitoring of footage.

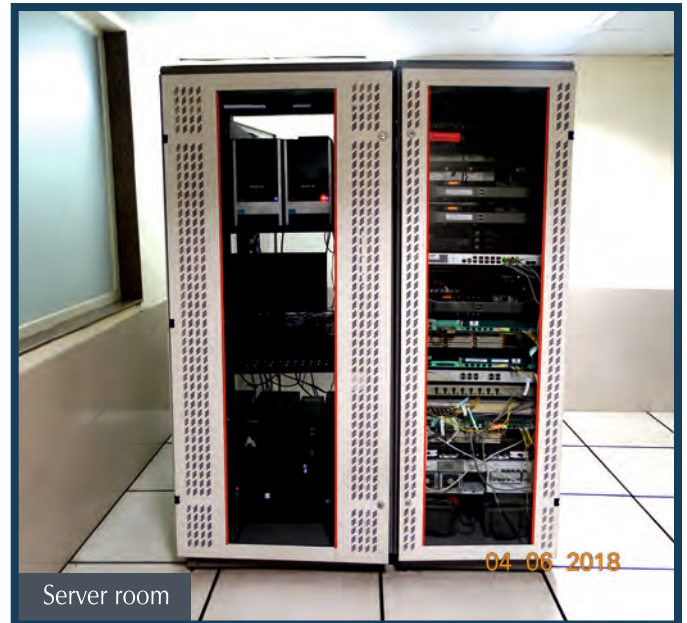

Boys & Girls Recreation rooms and Gymkhana

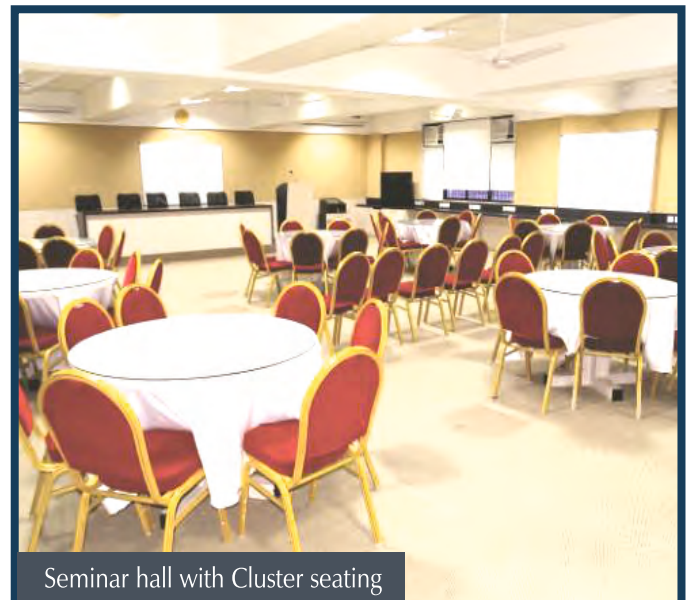

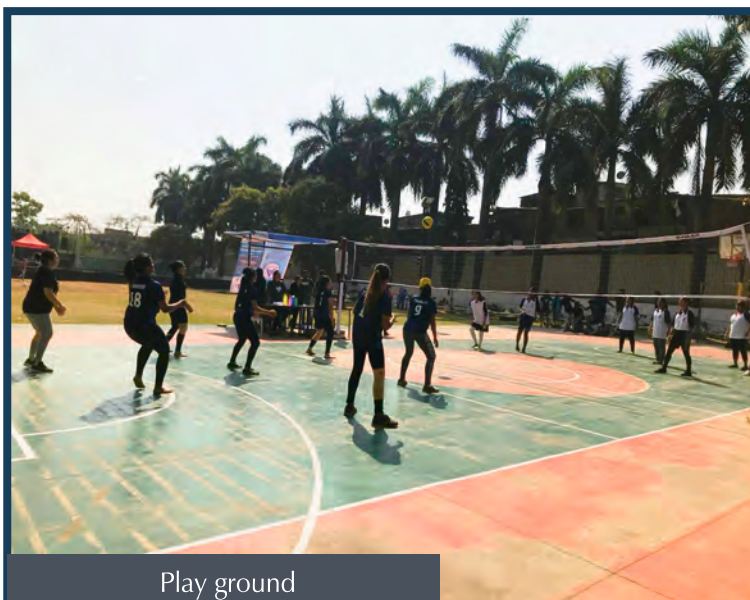

Team Building Orientation

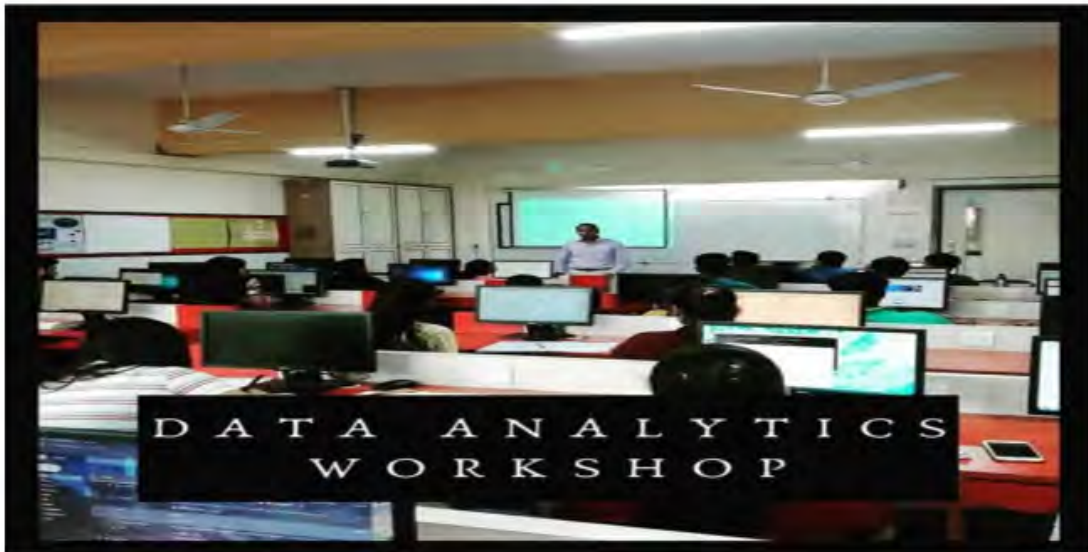
CSI-TCET brings you something new - the likes of which has never been seen here before. So a Team Building Orientation was conducted on 3rd October 2019.

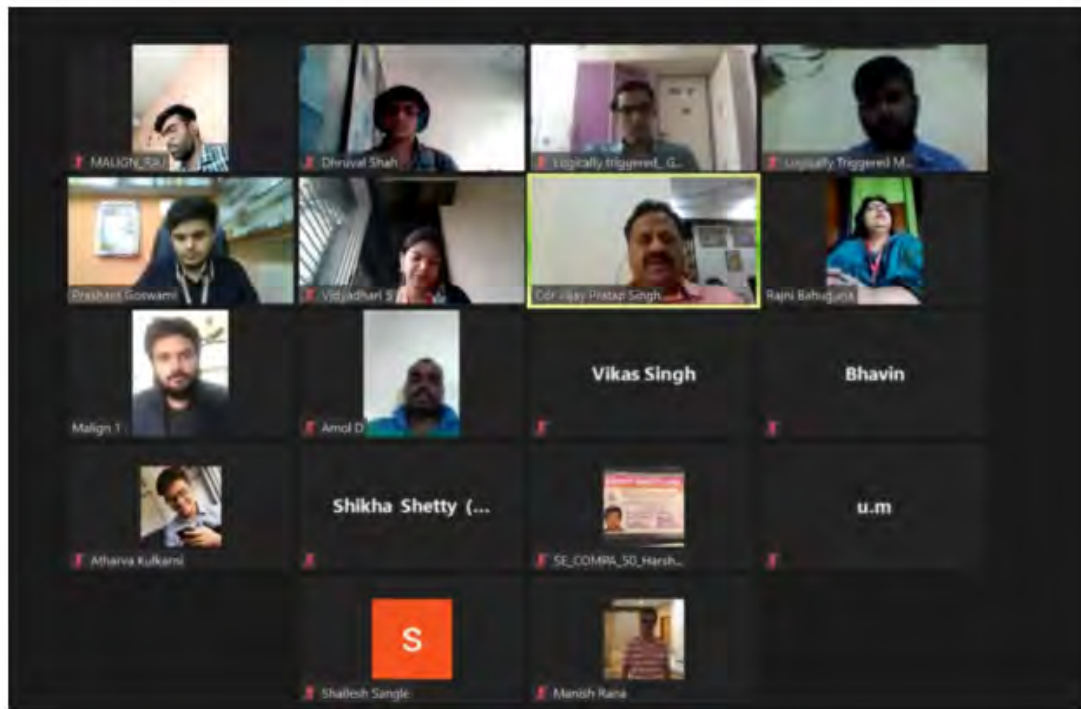


CSI WEEKENDER, E-TECHNOFEST '20

Their agenda and a brief summary of their discussions are given below:

UNHRC :

On the first day, the first agenda of UNHRC was passed and discussed that is the the responsibility to protect and prevention of genocide, war crimes, ethnic cleansing and crime against humanity. The inhumanity of ethnic cleansing across countries like China and Islamophobia, that has gained momentum in recent years was pondered and debated upon. Countries like USA were criticized for the inhumane treatment of immigrants, thus threatening world peace.

The second agenda was passed in the later hours of the second day of debate which was preventing and countering violent extremism and radicalism in Europe. Incidents like Germany's infamous discrimination against a Korean girl in a restaurant, the growing hate towards minorities who seek a better life for themselves and their restrictions and rights were discussed with quite a few countries against it suggesting that they do not pay equal taxes and were lessening the natives' jobs.

DISEC :

First day of the three-day conference was spent on discussing the first agenda, which was to destabilise effects of foreign military bases in sovereign states. Long discussion was carried out in the General Speaker's list and lobbying was done in unmoderated caucus. After lunch a moderated caucus took place too.

Second day was spent on discussing a topic under a moderated caucus, which later lead to presentation of 3 working papers from different delegates. One of the working papers was discussed in a question answer format. The aftermath of this discussion was intense debates involving almost every delegate in the General Speaker's List. 2 unmoderated caucus took place in between.

The third day was all about lobbying and led to the formation of 2 groups, resulting in two draft resolution proposals. One of them was passed successfully by consensus and hence the committee came to an end.

UNSC :

The agenda for the United Nations Security Council that was to be discussed, by the process of voting was the first agenda ' Dealing with Ukraine crisis with special emphasis on problems of militarization of Crimea, Sea of Azov and parts of Black Sea. The intense discussion started with USA and UK having complete different sides to the crisis the militarisation of the Azov Sea followed the construction of a new bridge in the Kerch Strait linking mainland Russia and Moscow-annexed Crimea. Kyiv considers the construction of this bridge unlawful and the EU criticised what it called another assault on Ukraine's territorial integrity.

USA pointed out that Russia started to block the passage of trade vessels through the Kerch Strait and in the Azov Sea, thus, violating the freedom of navigation, guaranteed by the Law of the Sea, the speaker also added Ukrainian side estimated that the workload of the Ukrainian ports is expected to decrease by 43% and so far there were \$54 million in losses were reportedly resulted from Russia's blockade, and the freight of crude iron to the US (about 100,000 tons per month) was almost blocked, as well as to the UAE, Saudi Arabia, Thailand, Taiwan. There was a fierce discussion that took place from the most experienced speakers in the MUN circuit. The discussion ended with USA and China together putting forward and passing the draft resolution.

UNDP :

As the floor opened for discussion on the first day, the delegates voted up for the first agenda i.e. "Combating climate change with special emphasis on the energy production in developing countries" to be discussed primarily. This was followed by a rigorous debate and discussion session with the developed countries like UK, Germany and Canada highlighting the loopholes in the energy production schemes of the developing countries and the later countering their claims.

During the course of debate a number of issues were discussed like the increasing amount of air pollution due to industrial activities in the developed countries, regulation and control of oil spills taking place in the oceans and the impact of amazon forest fires on the climatic conditions in the entire world. The delegates also emphasized on the various accomplishments of their governments in combating the climate change and the effectual ways in which the climate changes can be put under surveillance. Four papers in all were drafted at the end of Day Three.

The committee successfully passed a draft resolution with consensus.

UNGA:ESS :

The United Nations General Assembly had a single agenda throughout the three day conference, that is the Gulf Crisis of 1990. Countries presented their respective stands on it in the General Speakers List. A moderated caucus resulted in a heated debate on the involvement of such a large number of countries, which was deemed by some to be unnecessary and forced in some cases. The counter was just as strong, which suggested the countries participated in coincidence with their personal belief of their own free will. Neutral countries each proposed their own stand in the war, accusing and questioning the participating countries on certain actions of theirs.

Lok Sabha :

The agenda that was discussed in Lok Sabha was "J&K reorganisation bill 2019". This bill was introduced by Home minister of India, Mr. Amit Shah to bring the amendment in article 370 of Indian Constitution and revoke the special status given to Jammu and Kashmir. The Member of Parliament from Waynad, Mr. Rahul Gandhi carried the role of Leader of Opposition and Prime Minister, Mr. Narendra Modi was leader of house. The bill was introduced by Home minister at the third day after which the Speaker allowed to discuss the bill clause by clause. The topics that were discussed by house were "History of Article 370", "Advantages of Revoking special status from Jammu and Kashmir", "Violation of Human Rights in Jammu and Kashmir throughout the history" etc. which heated up the debate in the house. Government also suggested that Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh, should be declared as the Union Territories. Prime Minister and Home Minister were the target of Opposition in the 'Question Hour' and they answered almost all questions raised by opposition. A 'No Confidence' motion was raised by the Member of Parliament from Hyderabad, Asaduddin Owaisi on the third day which was not passed by the house. At the last session, Government failed to pass the 'J&K Reorganisation Bill' as they were not able to gain the simple majority in the house.

COMMITTEE REPORT

The International Press had Rapporteurs and Photographers in it. There was decorum and procedures were followed were held in the committee sessions, where countries were stating their stance and discussions were heating up and reaching high quality.
